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As a reminder, we are learning about prepositional phrases **in order to more easily find subject/verb agreement** in non-simple sentences. Remember, <u>the subject will NEVER be in a prepositional phrase</u>.

The SAT emphasizes **CONSISTENCY**.

Are the <u>subjects</u> consistent with the <u>verbs</u> in the sentence?

Are <u>verbs</u> consistent with <u>other verbs</u> in the sentence?

Are <u>nouns/pronouns</u> consistent with <u>other nouns/pronouns</u> in the sentence?
